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#### YUROK TRIBE PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICER ORDER #201117B

Yurok Tribe Plan for Reducing Risk of Covid-19 Spread November 17, 2020

Aiy-ye-kwee',

The Yurok Tribe is a sovereign nation and federally recognized tribe with over 6,333 enrolled members. The Yurok Tribe and the State of California are in a State of Emergency because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The spread of COVID-19 is a substantial danger to the health of the public within the Yurok Reservation. COVID-19 can easily spread between persons who are in close contact with one another.

The age, demographics, condition, and health of a significant portion of the population of the Yurok Tribe places its members at risk for serious health complications, including death, from COVID-19. Recent U.S Center for Disease Control and Prevention ("CDC") studies have shown that Native Americans are among the racial and ethnic minority groups at higher risk for severe COVID-19 outcomes. Persons have been shown to be infectious up to 48 hours before onset of symptoms, and as many as 50% of infections seem to occur in asymptomatic persons. All persons who contract COVID- 19, regardless of their level of symptoms (none, mild, or severe), may place other vulnerable members of the public at significant risk. Currently, there is no vaccine available to protect against COVID-19.

The COVID-19 Pandemic affecting the Yurok Reservation, Del Norte County, Humboldt County, the State of California, the United States of America, and global community, has created a Public Health Emergency and imminent threat to the Yurok Reservation, Yurok ancestral territory and surrounding regions, resulting in grave risk to the health and safety of Yurok people.

The COVID-19 Pandemic is expected to immediately overwhelm limited tribal resources in the event of any community-spread outbreak, as well as compromise the Yurok Tribe's ability to provide critical services to tribal members, thereby increasing the ongoing health and safety risks to Yurok members, reservation residents, property, environment, cultural knowledge, and the political integrity of the tribal government.

This Order is based on scientific evidence and best practices as currently known to the Yurok Tribe, including information from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the State of California, and the Del Norte and Humboldt County Health Officers. This Order is intended to

protect vulnerable members of the public and Yurok Tribe from avoidable risk of serious illness or death resulting from exposure to COVID-19.

The Yurok Tribe's response to COVID-19, and the response of surrounding governments, must be adaptable to frequently changing circumstances, including shift in number of positive COVID-19 cases, new health information, future availability of effective vaccine(s) or treatment(s), and impact on the health, safety, and political integrity of the Yurok Tribe and its members.

As such, the Yurok Tribe has adopted a general framework, the Yurok Tribe's Plan for Reducing Risk of COVID-19 Spread ("COVID-19 Plan"), based on a "tier" system that uses metrics that are tethered to readily available local health data. This framework is not, and will not, be the sole regulatory framework, but instead provides a clear general overview for different sectors and the general public based on the level of identified risk. This COVID-19 Plan also indicates which sectors are subject to more specific guidance and regulations, the guidance and regulation documents will be made available at the Yurok Tribe Office of Emergency Services website at www.yurokoes.org.

### Now, therefore, I, as Public Health Officer for the Yurok Tribe, order the following:

- 1. The enactment and implementation of the Yurok Tribe Plan for Reducing Risk of COVID-19 Spread.<sup>2</sup>
- 2. This Order shall be enforceable pursuant to Yurok Tribe law, including, but not limited to, the Yurok constitution and Yurok Tribe Public Health Ordinance.

#### **Terms of Orders**

- 3. This Order shall go into effect November 18, 2020.
- 4. This Order shall remain in effect until repealed by the Yurok Tribe Public Health Officer or repealed by the Yurok Tribal Council.
- 5. This Order does not repeal any other Yurok Tribe order, law, or regulation.
- 6. This Order is issued pursuant to the Yurok constitution and Yurok Tribe Public Health Ordinance.
- 7. If any provision of this Order to the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held to be invalid, the reminder of the Order, including the application of such part or provision to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected and shall continue in full force and effect. The provisions of this Order are severable.

#### YUROK TRIBE PLAN FOR REDUCING RISK OF COVID-19 SPREAD

The Yurok Tribe will use standardized metrics<sup>1</sup> [see image] to determine risk and Yurok Reservation "tier" designation for its *Plan for Reducing Risk of Covid-19 Spread*. These metrics complement state and local efforts and utilize the latest scientific understanding of COVID-19 and available health data that has been centralized by the state of California.

The Yurok Reservation is surrounded by Humboldt and Del Norte counties; if these counties have a differing tier designation based on these metrics, the Yurok Tribe will apply the strictest of the tiers across the entire Yurok Reservation. These metrics are subject to change based on the Yurok Tribe's own assessment of risk as guided by its Public Health professionals.

The latest metrics data, including current "Tier" designation for neighboring counties is available at: <a href="https://covid19.ca.gov/safer-economy/#reopening-data">https://covid19.ca.gov/safer-economy/#reopening-data</a>: \*Case Rate (rate per 100,000 excluding prison cases,7-day average with 7-day lag): Calculated as the average (mean) daily number of COVID-19+ cases, excluding cases among persons incarcerated at state or federal prisons (identified as cases with an ordering facility name or address associated with prison locations), over 7 days (based on episode date), divided by the number of people living in the county/region/state. This number is then multiplied by 100,000. Due to reporting delays, there is a 7 day lag built into this calculation. For example, for data updated through 8/22/20, the case rate will be dated as 8/15/20 and will include the average case rate from 8/9/20 - 8/15/20.

\*Adjusted Case Rate for Tier Assignment (rate per 100,000 excluding prison cases,7-day average with 7-day lag): Calculated as the Case Rate per 100,000 multiplied by the Case Rate Adjustment Factor that is based on the county's testing rate per 100,000.

<sup>\*</sup>Testing Positivity (excluding prison cases, 7-day average with 7-day lag): Calculated as the total number of positive polymerase chain reaction (PCR) tests for COVID-19 over a 7-day period (based on specimen collected date) divided by the total number of PCR tests conducted (excludes tests for persons out of state or with unknown county of residence), excluding tests for persons incarcerated at state or federal prisons (identified as cases with an ordering facility name or address associated with prison locations). This number is then multiplied by 100 to get a percentage. Due to reporting delay (which may be different between positive and negative tests), there is a 7-day lag. Example: For cumulative lab data received on 8/22/20, reported test positivity is dated as 8/15/20 and is calculated based on tests with specimen collection dates from 8/9/20 - 8/15/20.

<sup>\*</sup>Test Rate (tests per 100,000 excluding prison cases, 7-day average with 7-day lag): Calculated as average (mean) number of polymerase chain reaction (PCR) tests per day over a 7-day period (based on specimen collection date), excluding tests for persons incarcerated at state or federal prisons (identified as cases with an ordering facility name or address associated with prison locations), and divided by the number of people living in the county/region/state. This number is then multiplied by 100,000. Due to reporting delay, there is a 7-day lag included in the calculation. Example: For cumulative lab data received through 8/22/20, the reported 7-day average number of tests will be dated as 8/15/20 and will include PCR tests with specimen collection dates from 8/9/20 - 8/15/20.
